Welcome to the end of week 8. It has been a really busy week. The grade 5/6 students embarked on their Urban camp adventure. On Wednesday the grade 1's to 4's participated in the African Drumming incursion. Every child had an African drum and created lots of noise and wonderful drum rhythms. Today the Foundation students have gone to the Zoo by bus. I heard one foundation students say to his mum, "You better wake me up at 4.00am because I don't want to miss the bus!"

Every so often picking up and dropping off students gets a bit complex. There never seems to be enough car parking or cars are parked in inappropriate areas. The extension of Milne street (off Park Rd) has both the residents and parents of Crib Point school and St Josephs at odds with each other. Allegedly, cars are parking in front of driveways or over the walk ways. I have seen a garbage truck video (yes the garbage trucks have video cameras) where a car is blocking the residents bin and so the bin was not emptied. It is important that all of the Crib Point community support each other and are mindful of the need to drop/pick up children as well as not hinder access to property.

Here are some things to consider when parking;

- * Ensure you are not over the footpath
- * Park in a manner that will allow others to fit in
- * Drive slowly
- * Give driveways plenty of room to get in/out
- * With older students consider parking at Cyril Fox oval and getting the students to walk through the back gate safely

The school will contact the residents and remind them that the Mornington Peninsula Shire Council is responsible for all street parking management. Aggressive or abusive behaviour focused on street parking should be reported to local police.

Getting In the Zone

'Getting In the Zone' is an occupational therapist facilitated program which draws on the 'Zones of Regulation' and 'Social Thinking' principles.

The aim of this program is to develop your child's understanding of their arousal regulation and emotional regulation, and give them the tools they need to be able to self-regulate their behaviours.

Group sessions will be facilitated in our Mornington clinic by Krista Lenders and Amanda Martin, occupational therapists.
